01. Apply online, visit a Defence Force Recruiting Centre or call 131901

You will be asked to provide your:

- Personal details
- Academic achievements
- Job preference(s) (if you have them)

If sessions are available, you will be able to book a Your Opportunities Unlimited (YOU) session at the end of your application. The YOU session is designed to provide a less formal opportunity to find out more about the ADF. You will be able to talk to current serving Defence members about your interests and your eligibility for the many opportunities the ADF has to offer. Importantly you will not need to conduct the Fitness Test at the YOU session, this will not be conducted until after the Assessment Day later in the process.

What happens next?

Your Case manager will contact you with regard to your application and invite you to attend a Your Opportunities Unlimited (YOU) Session at your local Defence Force Recruiting Centre. Make sure you read and understand the information we send you via your booking confirmation email. In preparation for attending the YOU Session you need to log into your Candidate Hub to:

- Complete the Application Form. If you are under 18, make sure you have a
 discussion with both parents or legal guardian(s) in order to provide you with
 consent for testing.
- Complete the online Medical History Questionnaire.

02. Attend YOU Session

At the Your Opportunities Unlimited (YOU) Session hosted at your local Defence Force Recruiting Centre you will:

- Complete any outstanding forms from the Candidate Hub
- Take an aptitude test
- Talk to a Careers Coach about the service and role(s) you are considering

03. Attend Assessment Session

Once you have attended a YOU Session and have submitted your eligibility documents, you may be invited to an Assessment Session for:

- A medical assessment
- A psychological interview
- An ADF interview





04. Attend Officer Selection

If you've chosen an officer role you will have your leadership, teamwork and other areas of potential assessed:

- Attend an Officer Selection Board day
- Be interviewed by a panel of officers and a psychologist
- Participate in group and individual activities

05. Take a fitness test

During the Pre-entry Fitness Assessment (PFA) you will need to show us you can:

- Do pushups (Navy: 6 for females 15 for males, Army: 8 for females 15 for males, Air Force: 4 for females 10 for males)
- Do sit ups (Navy: 20, Army: 45, Air Force: 20)
- Complete a shuttle run (Navy: Level 6.1, Army: Level 7.5, Air Force: Level 6.5)

06. Attend Enlistment / Appointment Day

If successful, at your local Defence Force Recruiting Centre you will:

- Have a final medical check
- Join family and friends for the ceremony
- Head straight to Initial Military Training as an official member of the ADF

Have you secured an interview?

Before the interview, consider:

- Punctuality
- Grooming
- Greeting
- Eye contact
- Handshake
- Posture
- Listen to the information/question
- Answering questions in sentence form

Possible questions:

- 1. Why did you apply for this job
- 2. What do you know about what a person does in this occupation
- 3. What is your biggest achievement that you are proud of at the college
- 4. Tell me about your hobbies and interests
- 5. Give evidence of how you have practiced safety at school
- 6. What qualities to you have that what make you the preferred candidate
- 7. What is your favourite subject and why
- 8. What is your least favourite subject and why
- 9. How can you show evidence that you work well within a team
- 10. What evidence do you have that you will be a reliable employee. (punctual, reliable, honest, trustworthy)
- 11. Not everyone is perfect, so what do you think would be your challenges at this job
- 12. Do you have any question. (try to have a question, but not about money....yet)

Top five interview dos and don'ts

- Do your homework.
- Make a good first impression.
- Listen and respond accordingly.
- Prepare smart, open ended questions to ask the interviewer.
- Sell your strengths and expertise.
- Don't speak poorly about your present or former employers. (Or teacher!)
- Don't falsify information.
- Don't speak over the interviewer.
- Don't be late. Arrive 15 minutes early to allow time for possible delay and use the extra time to freshen up for the interview if you have arrived early.
- Don't be pushy about salary. Don't place a large emphasis on salary. ...
- Don't talk too much.
- Don't exaggerate.
- Don't over or underdress. Dress for success.

In summary

- 1: Sincerely thank your interviewers for their time.
- 2: Ask a question, even if you don't have one.
- 3: Practice your handshake.
- 4: Confirm your interest in the position.
- 5: Restate why you're the perfect candidate.

UOW College

102 of our year 12 cohort have applied for early admission to UOW. Have you considered the UOW college as a training option? (UOWC). Please find below some information to consider:

- The diploma courses at UOWC contain similar 1st year subjects to the degree.
- UOWC conduct more face to face lessons in smaller classes.
- Each student is supported with personalised tutorials
- Diploma course fees are Commonwealth supported and similar to the degree fees (around \$7900/year) and also may be deferred as a student loan.
- UOWC is not a second rate establishment
- UOWC is situated within the grounds of UOW
- Upon completion the Diploma you may:
 - Already work in the industry
 - Advance straight into the 2nd year of the degree course hence you are not behind in time.
 - Work in the industry and complete your qualification part time.





Course options

<u>Diplomas at UOW</u> provide an in-depth preparation for either further study (undergraduate bachelor degrees) or entry-level career opportunities.

Academic skills development is embedded in UOW Diplomas, with an emphasis on oral, written and presentation skills, and also group work.

Similar to an undergraduate course:

- subjects have a lecture and tutorial format, or lecture and laboratory format, timetabled over five days
- assessment is by practical tasks, essays, mid-session tests and final exams.

Upon completion, a recognised Higher Education Diploma qualification is awarded to students. Students who meet the UOW entry requirements are guaranteed entry into the first or second year of the relevant UOW degree.

Diploma options

These UOW Diplomas are Commonwealth Supported Places (CSP) for eligible domestic students. This means that students can benefit from **zero up-front tuition fees**.

- Diploma of Arts
- Diploma of Business (2 session)
- Diploma of Engineering (2 session)
- <u>Diploma of Information Technology (2 session)</u>
- Diploma of Medical & Health Sciences
- Diploma of Science (2 session)
- Diploma of Social Science

These courses are accredited by the University of Wollongong (UOW). UOW is registered by the Tertiary Education Quality and Standards Agency (TEQSA).

Tuition fees

UOW **Diploma** and **enabling pre-university courses** attract Commonwealth assistance for eligible domestic students

This means that you could benefit from zero up-front tuition fees.

How do tuition fees work?

Under the Australian Government's university funding model, eligibility for Commonwealth Supported Place (CSP) offers depend on either the course or the applicant. As a result, some UOW **Diploma** and **enabling pre-university** places at UOW are CSPs and some are full-fee paying places (FFPPs).

Tuition fees for UOW **Diploma** and **enabling pre-university courses** depend on a few factors:

- the type and duration of the program
- if places are Commonwealth supported or full-fee paying
- student eligiblity for Commonwealth support, scholarships or additional support through an equity program.

Student contributions (for CSPs) and tuition fees (for FFPPs) may be repaid via a deferred loan, depending on eligibility.

UAC Information

If you are applying to University, commencing in 2024 through UAC the closing date is the 29th September 2023 for early bird applications. After that a late fee applies.

USI (Unique Student Identifier) information

Anyone undertaking any education and training with a provider outside the school system must have a USI.

This applies to:

- Vocational Education and Training eg: study at Certificate or Diploma level through TAFE or other Registered Training Organisation (RTO's)
- Higher Education eg: Degrees etc. through universities and other providers

The Australian Government describes this as being a bit like a "Medicare number for education" and without one you cannot receive your qualification or get any sort of Commonwealth financial assistance.

This USI allows you to login to your training account and see all your VET training records and the results of all your courses. You can also print out all your results to take to an employer when you are applying for a job or to any training provider when you are doing any additional courses.

You must have this Unique Student Identifier before you can commence any courses. If you don't already have one, you can create one at www.usi.gov.au

Do you need help financially? Have you done well academically? Maybe you are an elite athlete? Whatever your situation, a scholarship can help you succeed at university. Studying can be expensive. They have a wide range of scholarships available to you which can assist with living costs, text books or that can contribute towards your fees.

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Year 12 checklist for applying through UAC

- Research available courses There are over 2,000 courses available for 2024 admissions via UAC. You can read descriptions of these courses on the UAC website: check the admission requirements and ATAR information. Once you've found your favourite courses, research pathways and alternatives so that you have a back-up plan. Take note of important dates in the application process.
- Get your USI Your Unique Student Identifier is your government issued student reference number that you will keep with you for life. You need it to enrol at an institution and receive Commonwealth financial assistance, including HECS-HELP and FEE-HELP. You may already have one if you've undertaken vocational education or training. You can create a USI – or check if you have one – at usi.gov.au.

Keep your UAC PIN safe You need your UAC Personal Identification Number to:

- apply for tertiary study through UAC
- access your ATAR. If you're a 2023 NSW HSC/ACT Senior Secondary Certificate student, your four-digit UAC PIN was emailed in April to the address you registered with NESA or the ACT BSSS. Note that your UAC PIN is different to your NESA PIN. For all other applicants, your UAC PIN is the first four digits of your date of birth; for example, if your birthday is 17 May, your UAC PIN is 1705. To protect your privacy, it's a good idea to change your UAC PIN once you've submitted your application. And, of course, keep your UAC PIN in a secure place. For more information, visit uac.edu.au/pin.

Apply for uni through UAC. Go to UAC's website to apply. You can select up to five course preferences. Even if you're not sure what you want to study, apply now and change your preferences later. We recommend you apply before 11.59pm on 29 September 2023 to avoid an increase in the processing charge. Remember to make a note of your application number. You'll need this number and your UAC PIN to log back in to your application to change your preferences.

Provide a current email address You'll need to provide a current email address when you apply so that UAC can let you know about the progress of your application. We recommend you log in regularly to check for messages.

Check your details are correct. Personal details you provided to NESA/ACT BSSS – including your first, middle and last name and your date of birth – will be automatically entered in your UAC application. If they don't match your official ID (eg your passport or birth certificate) contact UAC. All details must match when you enrol at uni.

Apply for schemes and scholarships Schools Recommendation Scheme.

The Schools Recommendation Scheme (SRS) gives you an opportunity to receive an early offer by being assessed on criteria other than, or in addition to, the ATAR. These criteria include school recommendations and senior secondary studies. SRS applications close at midnight on 18 September 2023. After this date, you cannot access or modify your SRS application. For details, go to uac.edu.au/srs.

The Educational Access Scheme (EAS) can help you gain admission to tertiary study if you've experienced educational disadvantage. Apply for EAS as part of your application for uni. We recommend you apply by 23 November 2023 so that you can be assessed in time for the main Year 12 offer rounds. For details, go to uac.edu.au/eas.

Equity Scholarships Equity Scholarships help the most financially disadvantaged students with the costs associated with higher education. We recommend you apply by 8 December 2023.
